
Dear Federal President:

Scientists may read *A Collection of Research Processes for Genealogy and Proofs* which were submitted to the chair of Electrical Engineering and Computer Sciences Department at the University of California, Berkeley in the USA. The papers that I sent to Professor Knuth are included in Section 17, Volume 2 of the collection.

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I openly invite any effort from academic communities to scrutinize my work. If Germany reaches any conclusions disputing my findings, please provide your opinion to Professor Knuth or me. If what I believe is true, please support me to lead computer science academia. I need your official endorsement. Thank you for your time. I will pray for your country.




